As part of the Badge Awards program, there will be 5 workshops (one for each badge level). We will run the workshops starting in November. Details are on the website at:

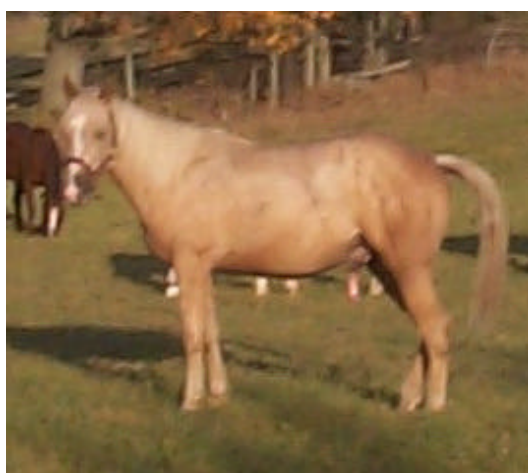
